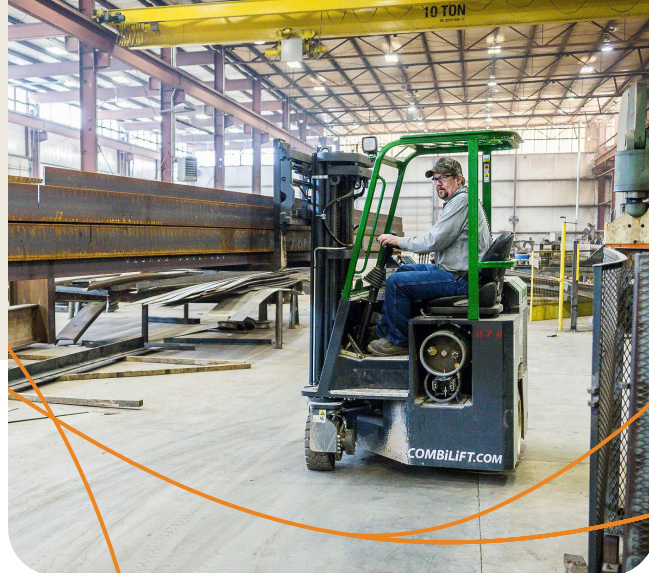


Forklift Safety

Each year, roughly 100 employees die in forklift accidents. Many employees become injured when forklifts are inadvertently driven off loading docks, fall between docks or an unsecured trailer and more. Review the following forklift safety tips with your employees.



Toolbox Tips

- Forklift operators must be trained, evaluated and certified. Frequent training refreshers are recommended.
- Forklifts must be inspected for hazards at the beginning of each workday or shift.
- Forklift inspections are vital—an inspection could turn up a hazard that could result in injury.
- Check these items:
 - Tire condition
 - Fork and mast controls
 - Brake controls
 - Steering controls
 - Warning equipment
 - Seat belt
- Know the lifting capacity of each forklift.
- Never lift weight greater than 90 percent of the forklift lifting capacity.
- Do not operate faster than the walking speed.
- Forklift operators must wear the safety belt when using a forklift.
- Never lift another employee on the forks.
- Never allow riders.
- Never overload forklifts.
